RE: Convention on Conventional Weapons cluster munitions work

Dear Ambassador Meister,

We are writing to express our strong concern at Germany's active support for the conclusion of a protocol on cluster munitions at the Fourth Review Conference of the Convention on Conventional Weapons (CCW), which will be held in Geneva on 14-25 November 2011.

If agreed, the August 26, 2011 version of the draft protocol would result in dramatically weaker protections for civilians than the strong protections provided in the 2008 Convention on Cluster Munitions, which Germany has signed and ratified.

The Convention on Cluster Munitions absolutely bans the use, production, stockpiling, and transfer of cluster munitions, and requires clearance and victim assistance. By contrast, the draft CCW protocol seeks to allow these activities to continue and its positive obligations on stockpile destruction, clearance, victim assistance, and international cooperation and assistance are far less detailed and comprehensive than those provided in the Convention on Cluster Munitions.

In addition to potentially weakening the stigma against cluster munitions contained in the Convention on Cluster Munitions, the draft protocol runs contrary to the primary purpose of international humanitarian law, which is to minimize suffering in war. The adoption of far weaker standards would represent an unprecedented and dangerous step backwards for the development of international humanitarian law. It could also undermine the humanitarian objective of the Convention on Conventional Weapons, which seeks to minimize suffering from weapons that "may be deemed to be excessively injurious or to have indiscriminate effects."

The costly decade of CCW deliberations on cluster munitions should be ended at the Fourth Review Conference and all states should accept that the Convention on Cluster Munitions is the most appropriate legal means to address cluster munitions and the harm they cause. We urge Germany to uphold its legal obligation to promote the Convention on Cluster Munitions and discourage any use of cluster munitions.

If Germany is sincere about wanting a CCW outcome that makes a significant humanitarian contribution, it should not support the creation of a protocol that would permit continued use, production, and/or transfer of a banned weapon. We urge Germany to not support a protocol that would permit ongoing use of cluster munitions known to cause unacceptable harm to civilians and recognize that there is no consensus on adopting the draft protocol.

We would be willing to meet to discuss this matter with you further. We urge you to convey our message to the Government of Germany.
